

Proposed Memorial Library Taking Shape:

At a Library Board meeting held Thursday, August 6, the architect for the proposed Kirkendall Memorial Library present preliminary sketches of the building which is to be located at the southwest corner of the Ankeny Park. The tentative plan is for an L-shaped building having in excess of 3,000 square feet of floor space. The building will face the south and the entire north side will be window area. A patio will be included inn the plan. *Ankeny Times, August 13, 1959*

Ankeny Schools to Open on Tuesday, Sept. 2: The doors to the Ankeny Consolidated School are scheduled to open for a one-half day session on Tuesday, September 2, it was announced Tuesday. Supt. Ralph Jorgenson reports the teaching staff is complete now, and things in general are ready for the big and busy new school year. A good deal of cleaning, painting and general maintenance work has been done during the summer months to get the three school buildings and grounds in shape for what will be one of Ankeny's largest school enrollments at Parkview, Grade, and High School. *Ankeny Times, August 7, 1958.*

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

The continuous line of 2,500 customers and friends filed past the food stands on the parking lot between 5:30 and 7:30 p.m. Tuesday. 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"Must Do" For Mail Delivery:

- 1. All houses must have visible house numbers and a mail box or a door slot marked "mail." No delivery will be made to houses without these.
- 2. Notify all your correspondents that house number and street are now required for delivery here.
- 3. All patrons wishing house delivery must file a written request with the postmaster immediately giving name and address or mail will be held at the post office in the lock boxes.
- 4. Delivery will not be made to any house not having all-weather walk from street to doorway.
- 5. Remember after September 6, 1958, no address means delayed mail. *Ankeny Times, August 7, 1958*

Ankeny Gets \$23,000 For Tornado System. In separate presentations Monday afternoon, the Ankeny City Council received a special award and a check for more than \$23,000. The Steel Plate Fabricators Association presented city officials with plaques noting the Tank-of-the Year award for the design and construction of the city's milliongallon water reservoir. Des Moines Fire Chief Lee Williams, representing the Department of Civil Defense, turned over to Mayor Weigel a check for more than \$23,000, which was the federal government's share for the city's tornado warning system. *Ankeny Press-Citizen, August 5, 1976*

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
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Hobo-Author-Former Ankeny Student.

Those who were in Ankeny Schools in the 20's and 30's might remember a classmate, Ken Wood. He lived south of Third on Des Moines Street before it was paved and remembers seeing the train collision on Third Street. Today he is Whitey Wood, just returned from Britt where he competed for King of the Hobos. His mother lives in Tampa, Florida now, and Wood was in the Ankeny-Des Moines area to publicize his recently published autobiography, "Hell on Earth," which is now on sale in Des Moines book stores. The book is called a "whale of an experience, a tragic-comic freefor-all that will take you to every bar, flophouse, and county jail between Sacramento, California; New York City, and Palatka, Florida. 

Anderson Receives National Recognition. Polk County Extension Director Ober J. Anderson received national recognition last week for his contributions to agriculture, community development, and youth. He was given the Distinguished Service Award of the National Association of County Agricultural Agents at the group's convention in Richmond, VA, August 15-19. Anderson, who offices at 3612 ½ Second Avenue, Des Moines, heads the largest county extension staff in Iowa. He was cited for his efforts in coordination of the staff's countywide educational programs. Special note was given to his work with the Des Moines Men's Garden Club and programs conducted in cooperation with Des Moines and Urbandale Schools. An Extension employee for 17 years, Anderson is active in other community organizations. He has been a member of the boards of directors of the Downtown Des Moines Kiwanis Club and the Polk County Easter Seal Society, and a member of the agricultural committee of the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce. Anderson has also been active in the Des Moines Jaycees. He is a member of the Living History Farms Foundation and the past president of the Ankeny Lutheran Church. 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


Chamber Endorses Norman For Superintendent Post – As

the Ankeny School Board moves into the process of seeking a new superintendent, another group is saying that the board need look no further than the Ankeny administrative office for the best person to replace retiring Supt. Keith Hopkins. In a July 29 letter to the board, the Ankeny Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors endorsed Dr. Ben Norman as a replacement for Hopkins, who is retiring in the spring of 1986. Norman has been with the Ankeny School District for nine years as administrative assistant. Earlier this summer, the board gave Norman an expanded job description, a salary hike and the title of assistant superintendent. The letter from the chamber board was signed by board president Greg Sunner and praised Norman's leadership in Ankeny's schools and his participation in community and business activities.

At last week's meeting, the board approved specifications for hiring a professional consultant to coordinate the search. The specifications were drawn up by a committee of three board members and outline exactly what services the board wants a consultant to perform, should one be retained. *Ankeny Press-Citizen, August 6, 1985*

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Ankeny Residents Are About To Be Counted – If Ankeny has taken the 871-person jump in population that is estimated, it could mean a \$39,000 jump in revenues and a more attractive backdrop for potential developers of business and industry. For these reasons, the Ankeny City Council voted earlier this year to ask the Commerce Department Bureau of the Census to conduct a 1985 head count of this city. The count will begin in early September. According to Ankeny Community Development Coordinator John Peterson, this special count will be only of people and will not include any of the extensive questioning asked of every so many residents during the regular census counts at the beginning of each decade.

Because of the funds which accrue to cities based on population counts, cities and towns are allowed at the middecade year to call for a special census count. In Iowa, these monies include those from Municipal Assistance, liquor profits and Road Use taxes for a total in Ankeny, of about \$45 per resident. Ankeny's official 1980 census count, thus the count used for such funding, is 15,429. Peterson says the estimate is that the city's population has increased to 16,300. *Ankeny Press-Citizen, August 27, 1985*



Deere Employees' Credit Union recently announced plans to develop a \$1.4 million office in Ankeny at the northeast corner of Highway 69 and Magazine Road. Groundbreaking ceremonies are planned for Tuesday, September 3rd, at 4:30 p.m. with construction to begin the next day toward a completion date of July 1st, 1986. The 12,000 square-foot new facility will include with the new office, an Automated Teller Machine (ATM), four drive-up lanes, safe-deposit boxes and a credit union/community room. Deere Employees' Credit Union was organized in 1950 to provide financial services to the employees of John Deere Des Moines Works. Today it has nearly 7000 members and over \$26 million in assets, making it the largest credit union in Central Iowa. *Ankeny Press-Citizen, August 27, 1985*
