#### FROM SWAMP LAND TO SUCCESS: THAT'S "THE ANKENY STORY"

Pioneer Residents Recall Earlier Days in Ankeny (Sixth in a multi-part series of excerpts from this article)

In 1903 Ankeny was incorporated with one square mile included in incorporation. Fred Riggenburg was mayor. Councilmen were: W.L. Wagner, G.E. Goughnour, Henry Wagner, L. Nelson, W.A. Hall, and J.H. Horning. Oley Landey was Marshall and Earnst Barr assessor, E.M. Lewis was clerk and J.G. Wagner, Treasurer. Telephone Service was instituted in Ankeny almost simultaneously by the Farmer's Telephone Co. and the Bell Telephone Co., in 1903. We now have the Bell dial system with free toll service to Des Moines.

The interurban road was built in 1907, a car going each direction every hour. Electric lights became available to Ankeny in 1907 on completion of the interurban line. Volunteer fire protection purchased by the town in 1907. The first fire protection purchased by the town consisted of three ladders and two dozen galvanized pails. Fire Dept., Jacob Abuhl, as fire chief, E.R. Wagner, Captain. Within the last several years the Ankeny fire equipment has been improved with the purchase of a modern fire truck and equipment, supplemented by a new booster pump.

In March of 1916 Bonds were voted for City Water Works, and a deep well was dug one block west of the present lumber yard site. This was completed in 1917. It was found necessary to have two additional wells one mile north of Ankeny, and in 1944 funds were allowed to enlarge the sewage disposal system.

The residential streets of Ankeny were first oiled in 1915 and the main street was paved for 6 blocks with concrete in 1929. In 1944 and 1948 the streets were resurfaced with a coating of rock, and asphalt. Along this main street, and nearby, businesses of all types have come into being providing Ankeny with a self-sufficient business and Professional Center.



That was enough to pay for the material involved for the building. The group elected officers- President- Mrs. Henry Volz, Treasurer- Maurice Brazelton, and Secretary- Mrs. A.G. Alleman. The executive Committee is as follows- R.F. Wilson, Larry Spenla, Harry Parmenter, Dewey Barton, Harold Frederick, Russell Sage and Tom Clark.

The executive Board met Monday night to draw up specifications for the new building. The committee to check on specifications and check on contract bids are- Dewey Barton, Harry Parmenter, Larry Sepnla, and R.F. Wilson. Donations and pledges thus far total \$3900. Plans are being made to finish contacting families and businesses in the area on the drive. *Ankeny Times, July 30, 1959*

#### **To Let Contracts On Congregational Church Addition**

August 7: The building committee of the Ankeny Congregational Church has announced that the letting of contracts for the new education wing will be held on August 7. It is expected the work will begin about 10 days later. A tentative completion date for the new structure is set for February 1, 1960. The \$55,000 addition will be on two levels and will house 8 classrooms, minister' study, and storage space. It will be constructed on the east side of the present building. 

#### Highest Bridge In Iowa Being Built

One of the highest, if not the highest highway bridge in Iowa is now under construction about three and a half miles south of Madrid. The bridge is located in the corner of the Boone-Dallas-Polk counties.

The more than a half million dollar bridge will be on the new relocated highway 60 which will go straight south from Madrid and cornect with highway 141 a mile east of Granger.

The bridge will be set on piers ninety feet tall with ten feet of the ninety buried in the earth. It will be 984 feet long. Grading work started March 17, the contract amounted to \$561,563.95 and is to be completed by December 13, 1958.

Workers are working two ten hour shifts daily to meet the dead line.

**VBS Program and Church Picnic at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church:** Holy Trinity Lutheran Church brought its two weeks of Vacation Bible School to a close on Friday. There were 16 volunteer teachers and assistants and 129 pupils, making a total enrollment of 145. The following was the record of attendance: Average attendance-131; highest attendance-135; perfect attendance-103.

Last Sunday morning in Sunday School period the VBS teachers and pupils presented a program to the congregation in which the various classes gave demonstrations of lessons and the program dealt with the Biblical truths summarized in the Apostle's Creed.

In the afternoon the congregation held its annual church and Sunday School picnic at the Ankeny Park. Approximately 130 children, young people, and adults were gathered at the potluck picnic dinner at noon and for the contests in the afternoon. The picnic served the special purpose of giving the congregation an occasion to extend the hand of welcome to the families that recently joined the church.



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

Meet your police department school liaison – The Ankeny Police Department has in the past, and must continue in the future, to modernize and update all procedures in order to keep up with the city's growth and expansion. A major function of the Police Department is the prevention and control of juvenile delinquency. In view that this problem area is effectively controlled, a school liaison system has been set up within the framework of the Ankeny Police Department. Officer Sid Conkel has an office at Ankeny High School and is responsible for any police problem that may arise at any of the schools including High School, Junior High and four Elementary Schools.

Officer Conkel feels one of the biggest problems facing School Liaison Officers is acceptance by the student body, but feels the Ankeny students are very receptive. Officer Conkel is especially appreciative to the faculty and administration of the Ankeny Community Schools for their cooperation in getting the program implemented. Proposed programs Officer Conkel plans to initiate are bicycle safety, work with school safety patrol, help establish a Cadet program within the police department and involving the officer on the street in school talks and rap sessions.

Sid is an Ankeny High School graduate and has been a member of the Ankeny Police Department since January 1971. He was assigned to the patrol section of the department until being appointed Police-School Liaison Officer in November 1973. He is a graduate of the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy and in May 1973 received a degree from Area XI Community College where he majored in Law Enforcement. *Ankeny Press Citizen –July 2, 1974* 



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

**Bond Issue Vote for High School next Monday** – Ankeny Community School District will vote Monday, July 7<sup>th</sup> to complete the Senior High School. The Board of Education expects a light turnout for the upcoming \$1,250,000 Bond election. Many folks are on vacation and / or involved in the "Centennial". They encourage everyone to cast their ballot on this issue. This will allow the students of Ankeny to finish their last three years of formal education in a completed facility.

The planned Stage 3 for the new high school complex consists of home economics facilities along with science and math classrooms. Stage 3 will also include the hot lunch area for students.


Superintendent Keith D. Hopkins stated, "Let's pass this issue and get our Senior High students back in school all day. The completion of this issue could release twelve classrooms from our neighborhood elementary schools. We had the largest Pre-Kindergarten enrollment in the history of this community – 296 children registered on April 21<sup>st</sup>. This is 42 more than ever pre-registered in the third week of April. This has been one of the largest building years, with over 70 new homes built this year."

Twenty-eight Kindergarten children living in the northwest section of Ankeny will have to go to Terrace Elementary instead of Northwest Elementary, and any student moving into the Northwest attendance area in the 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup> grade. *Ankeny Press Citizen –July 3, 1975*





Vietnamese family takes up in Ankeny – The Nguyen Phu Ngoan family arrived at the Des Moines Airport late Monday afternoon as families from Holy Trinity Lutheran Church an Our Lady's Immaculate Heart Church awaited their landing. Noonan, wife and children have been awaiting sponsorship by some organization in the United States. The family has been stationed at Camp Chaffee, Arkansas since May 12 after being rescued by the US Greenwave April 25. Sponsorship will be a joint set-up between Holy Trinity Lutheran Church and Our Lady's Immaculate Heart Church. A house at 517 SW Cherry was acquired two weeks ago and equipped with all the modern conveniences. Both churches agreed June 22 to take the responsibility of setting the family in a new adventure into life. According in a letter received by Rev. William Adix of Holy Trinity, the family converses mainly in French. But the father speaks both English and French fluently.

Prior to the Communist regime in So. Vietnam, the father was a contractor and landlord in Saigon. The man is very able in his occupation, equipped to various odd jobs. He repaired office machinery and vehicles, has done electrical and plumbing work, refurnished furniture, repaired fiberglass boats and swimming pools, and cared for orchards. His wife has served as a restaurant cook. The family's children range from 7 years of age to 19. The oldest daughter is ready to attend college for her first year. *Ankeny Press Citizen –July 24, 1975*

Ankeny-by-the-lake? City official says it's more than dream. Pssst! Wanna buy some property in Ankeny-by-the-lake? While lakefront property in Ankeny might seem to be a pipe dream, Ankeny's growth could push its boundaries about two miles westward to Saylorville by the turn of the century, said Community Development Director John Peterson. "We've been extolling the virtues of Ankeny," said Councilman John Voigt. "We've been trying to tell people in the state what we have to offer and we are making people aware of Ankeny." While unremarkable by standards of Des Moines' west suburbs, Ankeny's 20 percent population growth was 12<sup>th</sup> highest in the state among 272 cities with populations of 1,000 or more. Ankeny grew from 15,429 to 18,482 population between 1980 and 1990. Over the past four years, the city's property value increased about 13 percent. Ankeny Councilman Gerald Fehn said the city has a special allure in that it is located on the outskirts of a metropolitan area, yet still set in a predominantly rural setting. "We have the best of both worlds," said Fehn, an Ankeny resident for 21 years. *Ankeny Press-Citizen, June, 5, 1991* 

The Browns of Des Moines. I was very pleased to see that the Brown-Camp name had been retained for use with the renovation of the old Younkers warehouse into apartments. The Brown of Brown-Camp was Ernest Warren Brown (1867-1934) who would not have minded the reuse of the name a bit since he was the builder of the Brown Apartments (1912), which later became the Brown Hotel at Fourth Street and Keosaugua Way in Des Moines. ... To bring the story around to the beginning, Joseph and Rollin Valentine Ankeny were the father and brother, respectively, of John Fletcher Ankeny (1824-1886), the founder of Ankeny, just north of Des Moines. One of the daughters of John Fletcher was Susan, the wife of Ernest Warren Brown. The name connection is preserved in the person of Philip Ankeny Brown, grandson of Ernest Warren and Susan Ankeny Brown, a well-known Des Moines businessman who now lives in Okoboji in Dickinson County. #### Ankeny charges to lead. Baserunning helps Hawkettes sweep.

Aggressive baserunning helped fourth-ranked Ankeny sweep eighth-ranked Urbandale in a Central Iowa Metropolitan League National Conference softball doubleheader on Monday. The Hawkettes won both games in their final at-bats on close plays at home plate. Ankeny handed Urbandale its first conference loss with a 3-2 victory in eight innings in the opener. The Hawkettes then took the conference lead with a 2-1 victory in the nightcap. Carisa Albin singled to lead off the seventh inning of the second game. Albin moved to second base on a sacrifice by Leah Heston before stealing third base. Algin scored on Jenny Voss' bunt. *DM Register, July 2, 1996* 

Ankeny council to hold meeting on one-cent tax. The Ankeny City Council will hold a special meeting at 5 p.m. Monday at City Hall to discuss the proposed countywide one-cent sales tax. Ankeny Mayor John Voigt said the public forum will explore ideas on how money from the tax could be spent if the proposal passes. Projections show that Ankeny would receive more than \$2.2 million in additional revenue. "We welcome input from any interested party," Voight said.

Ankeny girls win, honor coach. Since 1972, Ankeny softball players have feared "the look" that Coach Dick Rasmussen gives his players when they fail to perform up to expectations. Wednesday night, Rasmussen had a different look – tears filled his eyes during a ceremony commemorating his final regular-season home game as the Hawkettes' coach. The surprise tribute took place after secondranked Ankeny defeated ninth-ranked Lincoln, 1-0, in 11 innings in a non-conference game. Rasmussen was presented with an engraved jewelry box. He was overcome with emotion when he tried to address the crowd. "I didn't think I would do this," Rasmussen told the crowd. "I'm supposed to be pretty hard core. I guess I have a heart after all." Rasmussen has compiled a 1,158-314 record in 33 years of coaching. He is 935-248 in 25 seasons at Ankeny. Rasmussen has won 12 state titles, 11 with the Hawkettes. *DM Register, July 18, 1996*




