Ankeny Wins Hawkeye Conference: The local football team wound up a successful season Wednesday night by defeating Johnston High 6-0. The Hawkeyes connected on a pass from a spread formation in the last 22 seconds of the game to score. The season record is as follows: Ankeny 13 Johnston 6, Ankeny 18 Colfax 0, Ankeny 12 Madrid 6, Ankeny 6 Woodward 0, Ankeny 19 Nevada 0, Ankeny 24 Story City 0, Ankeny 6 Johnston 0. *Ankeny Times, November 12, 1943*

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Elementary PTA Hears Discussion of the Hot Lunch Program in the Ankeny Schools. The Ankeny Elementary PTA meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, November 9, at the Central Elementary School. The minutes were read by Mrs. Gene Muehlenthaler, and the treasurer's report by Mrs. Wm. Day. Mrs. Keith Silver, room representative, gave a report on the homeroom coffees which were held last month. These coffees were well attended by mothers, and had an average attendance of 57%. Mrs. Silver thanked everyone who had helped to make them possible.

PTA president, Mrs. Gerald Tomlinson, reported on the sidewalk project. She also stated that volunteers to help the Polk County TB and Health Assoc. with the annual mailing of Christmas seals were needed. Anyone interested in helping is to contact Mrs. Frank Moran.

Program chairman, Richard Logli, introduced the afternoon kindergarten children from East Elementary School, who, accompanied by Mrs. Harlan Rigby, presented two nice musical numbers. Superintendent Keith Hopkins was then called upon, and he introduced the Ankeny lunch program workers. Mr. Hopkins said that Ankeny's lunch program was a Type A program. This means that is has a lunch menu which is a balanced diet and consists of: ½ pint of milk; 2 ozs. Of protein; ¾ cup veg. or fruit; 1 slice of bread; 2t. of butter. This requirement is more than sufficiently met daily. Food is all prepared in the one kitchen in the high school, and is then transported by the lunch truck to the other schools. An average of 1,300 children are fed daily. Ankeny's government aid consists of 20% of the total commodities used; therefore, leaving 80% to come from the lunch program. *Ankeny Press Citizen, November 2, 1964*

2,200 Citizens Sign Petitions Against Airport: The Ankeny City Council refused to consider pulling their support from the Airport Authority they voted to establish and Mayor Ollie Weigel told an overflow council chamber audience that their objections to the proposed airport location should be directed to the Federal Aviation Authority, the Environmental Protection Agency and other federal agencies involved with site approval. Mayor Weigel's remarks followed presentation of 2,200-plus signatures of Ankeny residents opposed to a northeast Polk County airport on the southeast border of the city. Attorney, Robert Nading, who represents the group, outlined a list of objections to the site, located east of I-35 and the Metro North industrial park and south of Orabalor Road. *Ankeny Today, November 8, 1990*



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Ankeny State Bank and Altoona State

Bank announced plans to merge the two banks. The name of the combined bank will become Community State Bank. Dale C. Froehlich, President of Ankeny State Bank, said, "The banking industry is constantly changing and we feel that the merger will enable our banks to compete more efficiently and effectively. Our customers will be better served in the future by one combined community banking organization. The new name of Community State Bank reflects our commitment to meeting the needs of the communities of Ankeny and Altoona." Ankeny State Bank has approximately \$100 million in assets and has served the Ankeny community since 1902. Altoona State Bank was chartered in 1960 and has approximately 35 million in assets. The Ankeny City Council took the first step in closing part of SW 2nd Street after a lengthy but genteel public hearing on the matter in front of an overflow crowd at the council chambers Monday. The City Council approved a resolution that sets forth the terms and conditions for the vacation and sale of a specific section of SW 2nd Street between Walnut Street and its intersection with northbound and southbound alleys. The resolution was approved on a 4-1 vote with Councilman John Voigt as the lone dissenter.

The street vacation has been proposed by officials from the Ankeny First Methodist Church to accommodate a \$2.1 million expansion project. The church plans to expand northward across 2nd Street to property that the church owns. That property now serves as a parking lot. Ankeny Press –Citizen, November 4, 1992

The Ankeny City Council approved the purchase of an ambulance and agreed to pay for a master plan of Otter Creek Golf Course during a special meeting Monday. The Council passed a resolution to have an architectural and design firm create a master plan for Otter Creek, Ankeny's public golf course. The Council agreed to hire William and Associates for \$9,700. Otter reek Manager Kevin Beard said a master plan is needed so future projects can all work togeth4er in a cohesive plan.


The Council also approved the purchase of an ambulance from Smeal Fire Equipment of Rock Rapids, Iowa for \$81,289. As part of the contract, Smeal will buy the old ambulance for \$10,000. Fire Chief Tom Strait said the new ambulance will replace a 1981 ambulance that had about 80,000 miles. *Ankeny Press-Citizen, November 11, 1992*



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A year of planning and hard work was fulfilled on Saturday when members of the Ankeny Visual Image Committee and other volunteers planted about 130 trees along East First Street. The group was also helped by City of Ankeny workers who drilled the holes and moved the trees into place. The trees stretch from Delaware Avenue to just west of Trilein Drive. The species of trees selected are Cleveland Select Pears and Indian Magic Crabapples. Saturday's project cost about \$16,000.
