War Pushed Hild Into Politics: When the building of the Des Moines Ordnance Plant forced Roy Hild off his farm, he decided to enter politics. He ran for the Polk County Board of Supervisors, was elected.

Two Indictments: Today the balding, 68-year-old Hild is under two indictments charging he obtained money by false pretenses. He pleaded innocent to one charge, hasn't been in court yet on the other. He continues to hold his post of board chairman even though he's at liberty on \$6,000 bonds.

He is charged in one indictment with arranging a false claim of \$703 for gasoline and for the repair of county welfare cars. The other indictment involves orders totaling \$1,192.50 for 50 tires and 50 tubes. Garageman Elmer Croft, whose testimony has helped convict two other former supervisors, is key in the Hild prosecution, too. Croft, himself serving a 7-year sentence, says he bought Hild a \$265 diamond ring and \$85 worth of flowers, not to mention regular monthly payments of \$100 to \$150.

All this is a strange development for the genial, bespectacled Hild who decided in 1941 to spend the rest of his life in comfortable contentment on his 145-acre farm near Ankeny. But, like millions of other Americans, he didn't realize that Pearl Harbor was coming to turn everybody's life topsy-turvy. The nation needed cartridges, billions of them. A plant had to be built at Ankeny. Hild's farm had to be taken from him. He got \$23,000 from the government out of the deal.

For his try at politics, Hild was well-prepared. He had a farm background, had business experience as a druggist, a real estate man and district sales manager at a cement company. In World War I he directed the Y.M.C.A. motion picture program in France. He previously had served in a hospital unit during the Mexican border troubles. Hild got the second district Republican nomination for supervisor in 1942, then easily won in the general election. He took office in 1944. He was re-elected in 1946. *Des Moines Register, June 22, 1947. Doris Bunz Scrapbook Collection*

Death Comes to Polk City Woman: Mrs. John Lint Passed Away On Monday-Funeral Services Held This Afternoon: Mrs. John Lint, a resident of the Polk City community for many years and her entire lifetime a resident of Polk County, passed away at her home Monday following an illness of considerable duration. Her death was attributed to complications which developed following an attack of the flu. She was 82 years of age.

The deceased was born in Polk County, March 22, 1865, a daughter of the late Henry and Arbell Harvey. She is survived by her husband who is 101 years of age and several children: Sons are Chester Cornwell, Ankeny, Oscar and Eddie Lint, Polk City, and Henry Lint, Ankeny. Daughters are Mrs. Ray Sheppard, Johnston; Mrs. Cora Sexauer, Ankeny, Mrs. Mary Banning, Des Moines.

Funeral services are being held this afternoon at the Gospel Missionary church in Polk City with Rev. W.C. Berggren, the pastor in charge. *Publication unknown, June 16, 1947; Doris Bunz Scrapbook Collection*

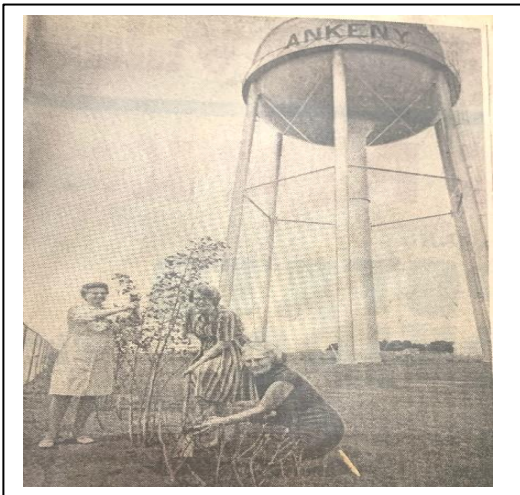

1960s

...Louie Fontanini will retire July 1 as fire chief after 10 years as chief and 40 years as an Ankeny fireman. The first equipment that he had in his years on the force was a hand-drawn wagon.

...The Yankee Clipper offers freshly baked pizza to go for \$1 large and 60 cents for a small.

...Jim Good and Mike Pertzborn are two local participants in the Soap Box Derby in Des Moines.

...Three Kansas City men have been arrested and accused of attempting to break into Paullin's Jewelry in Ankeny.

...Dennis Ballard is named as the new full-time Ankeny patrolman.

..Charles Mynatt is named new Ankeny fire chief. A John Deere employee, Mynatt has been a volunteer fireman for five years.

..."Jumpin' Gimmy" opens in Ankeny at the corner of Hwy 69 & First Street. It has over a dozen ground level trampolines for rent days and evenings.

...Iowan Joyce Rice, a national baton twirling champion, is guest performer at Elwell's Food Market on Saturday.

...Thieves broke into McCleary's Shoe Store and took \$30 in cash register exchange and a transistor radio.

...Eddie Hoskins, 21, a lifetime Ankeny resident, drowns at Avon Lake just southeast of Des Moines.

Ankeny Press Citizen – June 24, 1965

...John Hanifen of Ankeny was injured by lightning when he called to check on weather conditions there from his Second Avenue business. A lightning bolt traveled through the phone line knocking Hanifen off his feet at the office and into a wall. He was treated for a severe headache at Broadlawns and released.

...The third outdoor band concert of the summer is Thursday. In addition to Ankeny High School's band performing in Wagner Park, the twirling of Jill Vulcano will show their stuff. The twirlers will be Shirley Reynolds, Kristin Reynolds, Linda Ryan, Marjorie Cobb, Susie Dutcher, Tamera Boettcher, Marsha Aunan, and Linda Sampson.

...Nine young ladies will be in contention for the title of Miss Ankeny during next week's July 4th celebration. The nine attend Ankeny schools. Chuck Workman, an expert on the trampoline gives jumping lessons from noon until 11 p.m. The Jumping idea is not a new one as trampoline jumping is an established Olympic sport and recognized by the AAU. The popularity and fun of this recreation was started in California and Florida two years ago and is now invading the middle west. *Ankeny Times – June 16, 1960*

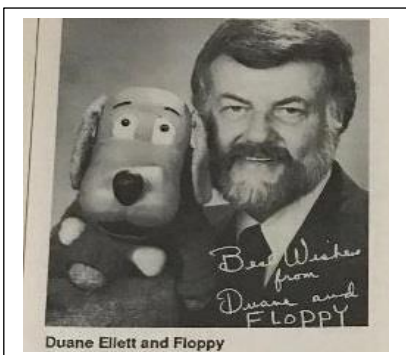

Brannan Appointed Supervisor - At this writing, (Thursday, June 17) Richard A. Brannan of Ankeny was appointed to the office of Polk County Supervisor for the third district. This move ousted treasurer Carl Bogenrief from getting the post. The people empowered by state law to fill vacancies on the board are: recorder, Irene Maley; auditor, James Maloney; and clerk of court Michael Doyle. On Saturday, June 14, two of those officials, Mrs. Maley and James Maloney, signed a resolution appointing Bogenrief as Supervisor. Mrs. Maley withdrew her signature from that resolution Tuesday. Maloney is in Canada on a fishing trip and was not present to sign the new resolution appointing Richard Brannan. Brannan will succeed William Fortune who was appointed to the position originally in a similar move by recorder, Maley, and clerk of court Doyle, and Bill McCullough whose position as auditor is now held by James Maloney. Fortune has been appointed to a new post, director of secondary highways.

Mrs. Maley indicated that she shifted her support from Bogenrief because at the time she signed the original resolution she "understood" no one else was interested in the appointment. Later she learned labor was still interested in it and transferred her support to Brannan. *Ankeny Press Citizen – June 19, 1969*

Ankeny Council accepts deed for sports complex. The Ankeny City Council Monday night accepted a deed to Ankeny school land where the city plans to build an adult soccer/softball complex. City Manager Carl Metzger said the city must own the property near Hawkeye Park in order to get a \$35,000 grant from the National Park Service to help finance construction of the \$170,000 project. The city is contributing \$75,000. The school district is contributing \$10,000 and the land. Once it is built, the city will manage the facility. The district's gift of the land, north of Parkview School, assures completion of the complex by next spring, barring construction mishaps or snags in getting the grant. Metzger said the grant is expected to be approved in the next week, and the soccer/softball committee is expected to evaluate the field's design and make recommendations at the Council's June 23 meeting. *DM Register, June 4, 1986*

Vanni pitches pair of shutouts to lead Ankeny to tourney title. Angie Vanni posted two shutouts and allowed only four base runners in two games as she pitched a second-ranked Ankeny to the McDonald's Invitational softball tournament title at Lion's Park in Urbandale Saturday. Vanni blanked Newton, 8-0, on two hits as Ankeny (12-1) captured the Big Mac Division crown. She then tossed a one-hitter as Ankeny stopped Hoover, 4-0, for the overall championship. *DM Register, June 15, 1986*
